Mr. Horeb Church was organized at the house of Mr. Samuel Boone, a nephew of the old pioneer, Daniel Boone, and a cousin of Captain Callaway, for whom the county of Callaway was named. Mr. Boone came to this country while Missouri was still yet a territory, and settled near a little stream called Prairie Fork, in Callaway County in the year 1818. Here he opened up quite a farm. In the year 1830 the Salem Baptist association, including the Baptist churches in Callaway, Boone, Warren, and Montgomery Counties, held its annual meeting at the residence of Samuel Boone. Great preparations were made by Brother Boone and the citizens of that community for this meeting, and the guests were royally entertained. The Brethren had an abundance of Venison, wild turkey, wild shoots, mutton and beef while the sisters had even excelled the brethren in their great supply of corn and wheat light bread pound cake, ginger bread, fried apple and peach pie sweet potatoes, honey, and a few johnnie cakes, and ash cakes for the delicate and dyspeptic Brethren. The following ministers were present and took part in the business of the association, David Doyle, Anderson Woods, James Saggett, Thomas P. Stephens, Alia B. Snethen (known also as Alexander) John Ham, Theodrich Boulware, David Doyle was moderator and Williams Jewel was Clerk. The Baptist were urged at this meeting to take steps toward organizing a Baptist Church. These are the names of the constituent members, Samuel Boone, Willis Hawkins, Jessie Van Cleve, John Gregory, Benjamin Brashers, Ann Boone, Mary Hawkins, Lucy VanCleve, Elizabeth Gregory, Mary Brashers, Sarah Carter, and Susan a Colored Woman. Elders William Coats and Ali Snethen composed the council that organized the church. Samuel Boone was elected clerk and Willis Hawkins and Benjamin Brashers Deacons. Elder Coats was the first pastor, and served the church in the church in that capacity until April 1836. At the April meeting on Sunday he preached a very able and earnest sermon, near the close of which he remarked, to the congregation, that he felt sure this day would close his work on earth. He urged the Brethren and Sisters to be pure and faithful to God and the church. And Closed with a powerful appeal to the unconverted. He went home and was taken ill and passed away April 22, 1836. Thus closed the early life of the first Pastor of Mount Horeb Church who did a telling work. The next pastor was Ali B. Snethen, who served the church faithfully for nine years successively. The church greatly prospered under his pastoral care. Up to the year 1840 the church had been holding all of its meetings in private dwellings, and in groves in the woods. A good portion of the meetings were held at the home of Samel Boone. In the spring of 1840 the church decided to build a meeting house. Jephtha Boone donated the land, and a double log building was erected thereon, with a pen on either side, in one of which was a door and in the other the pulpit. This building stood on a little summit near the cross roads, on the farm later known as the Colonel Kettle farm now owned and occupied by Mr. Louie Tate. Mt. Horeb Church the year it was organized, was received into the fellowship of Salem Baptist association, and continued in that relationship until 1838 when trouble arose in the association over the mission question, the Salem Association becoming anti missionary in spirit and practice. Mr. Horeb Little Boone Fenne, Columbia and Nashville Churches withdrew from the association and together with Providence

Freedom and Salem, met at Providence Church in Callaway County, November 16, 1839 and formed the Little Bonne Femme Association. Overton Harris was the first Moderator and Ali B. Snethen the first clerk. Mr. Horeb grew and prospered and soon became one of the leading Churches of the Association, and on the 15th of August 1841 the Little Bonne Femme Association convened in its third annual meeting with this church. It was a meeting. People came from over the country to attend the meetings, and as there was still plenty of wild game, the brethren had no trouble furnishing that great crowd of people with the best of meats. Overton Harris was elected Moderator, D. B. Williams clerk, and Elder Joseph Nichols preached the introductory sermon. During the time of the meeting of this association, Mr. Horeb held a business session and selected a council from Ministers present, and requested said council at the close of the association to examine and if found worthy, to Ordain to the work of the gospel Ministry one of its members, Robert Hill. The Presbytery consisted of Elders Joseph Nichols, R. S. Thomas, Ali B. Snethen, Thomas Fristo and Fielding Milhite, who in the presence of a large assembly of people, after a thorough examination which lasted over two hours, set apart Brother Hill to the full work of the Gospel Ministry, after which the moderator lined that old hymn Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me. And the congregation joined heartily in singing and extending to Elder Hill the hand of fellowship, recognizing him as a minister of the Gospel. As hymn books in those days were very scarce, the preacher would read the first two lines of the hymn and then the congregation would sing those lines, and then pause until the next lines were read. After singing the first hymn the moderator called on another brother to select and line a hymn, and that old hymn, Jesus, my all to heaven has gone to the chorus I want to go, I want to go there to, was selected. This service continued until some five hymns were line and sung. Thus ended one of the greatest meetings ever held by the Little Bonne Femme association. Thus the church continued under the care of Elder A. B. Snethen until January 1846 at which time he tendered his resignation, the church with deep regret accepted Brother Snethens resignation, and after a short time secured the services of Noah Flood as Pastor, who served the church acceptably, and did a good work. A few years previous to this period a young man by name of James H. Tuttle came into this community and secured a school. He was a teacher and took up his abode at Samuel Boones, who had several ix children to send to school. Among these was Miss Martha, a bright and beautiful young girl. At the close of the long spring and summer days, after helping her mother with her evening work, she repaired often to front yard, where, under the old catalpa tree she sat with her teacher listening to the chirp of tiny crickets and sweet yet somewhat lonesome notes of whip-poor-will and while there he wooed and won her and she became his companion for life. The old gentleman her father, being a faithful Baptist, and having taken a great interest in the Baptist cause in that community, secretly cherished a hope that his young son-in-law might become Preacher of the Gospel, and soon realized the desire of his heart, for James H. Tuttle soon began to exercise his gift in public, and was licensed to preach, by Mount Horeb Church, on the second Sunday in Oct. 1847, in the presence of a large congregation, he was publicly set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry Elder A. B. Snethen and Noah Flood composed the presbytery. On the 11th day of August 1848 the Little Bonne Femme Association met in its tenth meeting with Mount Horeb Church.

Great preparations had been made by the brethren and sisters to entertain the association, and the vast crowd that gathered was royally entertained. Elder Noah Flood was elected moderator and W. W. Keep, Clerk, W. W. Keep preached the introductory sermon. At the close of the business session of the association on Saturday, the Moderator preached a powerful gospel sermon at the close of which Mr. Rubin Snethen who afterwards was elected District Judge of Montgomery County, and Mr. Stephen Maugh, a gentleman past seventy years old, came forward and united with the church by experience. There was a powerful demonstration of the spirit of God, and the meeting continued for a number of days and the dear old log house on the hill became a sacred place to many a christian heart, and Gods Children from all parts of the country gathered in the old church home, sang, read the word, prayed and preached all day long. Scores of men and women were led to accept Christ and rejoiced in a Saviours love. On the second Saturday in December, 1848, James Tuttle was unanimously chosen as Pastor of Mt. Horeb church. He served the church in this capacity for four years, during which time the church prospered. Brother Tuttle did an excellent work and a large number were added to its fold. Elder George D. Tole followed Brother Tuttle in pastorate of Mt. Horeb church, and preached for the church six for two years. He was a noble good brother and did a fine work. On Friday August 25, 1854 the Little Bone Famine Association assembled in its 16th annual gathering with this church. Joseph Flood was Moderator, D. H. Hickman clerk and Elder J. E. Welch preached the introductory sermon. The association closed on Monday, and the meeting continued for two week with great interest. A number were saved and added to the church. On Wednesday, the 30th day of August 1854, Elder B. B. Black was chosen as pastor and continued to preach for the church until March 1857. It was by this church that he was ordained to the full work of the gospel ministry, William Thompson, Noah Flood and Fielding Milhite composed the council that ordained him. Elder Black did a good work and was highly esteemed by the church during the later part of his pastorate the church decided to move over the line into Montgomery County, and build a large frame house of worship, 40 x 60 which was completed in 1860. At the business meeting of Mount Horeb in March, 1859 Elder M. T. Bibb was elected pastor and continued to serve the church for about eleven years. He was a man of positive convictions and unquestionable integrity. He lived among his people and wielded a good influence in the community. Even those who did not agree with him in his religious and political views highly respected him. During his pastorate the time came for the annual election of pastor, Elder Bibb said to the brethren and sisters, now if you think best and are tired of me as pastor vote for whomsoever you please, and it will be alright but if the vote is unanimous, I will try and serve the church as best I can. His son, Tom, a young man thought it bad taste to vote for his own father, and cast his vote against him, the tellers after counting the vote announced, that Elder Bibb had received all votes cast save one. Whereupon the old Brother arose and said in his plain and positive way, Brethren, there is manifest objections to me; I therefore decline the call, and the church is without a pastor. The deacons came at once to the front and explained the situation that his son Tom, a modest young man, thought it bad taste or improper to vote for his father and very soon all was satisfactory and Bro Bibb continued as pastor. The association again convened with Mt. Horeb church including the fourth Sunday in August, 1865. D. H. Hickman was elected moderator and Joseph Flood clerk. Elder John Robinson preached the introductory sermon the meeting was largely attended and peace and harmony prevailed. The

meeting was protracted following the association and great interest was manifested. People were glad of the opportunity of attending the services of God, and took time to do their duty. The meeting resulted in forty six additions by Baptism and two by letter, and one by restoration. At the close of Elder Bibb's first pastorate, Rev. S. P. Bestwick served the church as pastor, and following him elder J. D. Hobnett was called and served the church for three years. After this elder Bibb was recalled and during his second pastorate his son, Rev. Martin Luther Bibb was Ordained by the church to the work of the Gospel Ministry on the 9th Sunday in October 1876, Elder M. T. Bibb and Dr. W. Pope Yeaman composed the council. On the fourth Sunday in December Elder James T. Tuttle was elected Pastor. During his second pastorate he held a series of meetings at Mt. Horeb which continued two weeks, and although there were large crowds in attendance, yet the meeting closed without any visible results. The last night of the meeting Elder Tuttle preached a powerful sermon, made an earnest appeal to the unconverted and said I want you people to know if you are lost these old skirts of mine are clear, and closed the meeting. In the early days of Mt. Horeb, the church would set apart certain days for fasting and prayer. Almost the entire membership would gather at the meeting house and sing and pray the live long day. People those days who professed religion, took time to serve the Lord, read his word and call upon His Holy name in Prayer. Tuesday after the first Sunday in August, 1840 was set apart as a day of fasting and prayer. Often these special days for fasting and prayer were followed with a series of meetings. A great revival was experienced, and scores were led to Christ. At the close of the meeting they were having ~~xxix~~ zero weather, but a large congregation gathered on the banks of Prairie Fork, built a large log heap, set fire to it, cut the ice and cleared away a passage into the creek and while the venerable Pastor led the candidates into the water to baptize them, the Brethren and sister stood on the banks and sang, Brethren, if your hearts are warm ice and snow can do no harm. Mt. Horeb church continued to grow and prosper year by year, and great good was accomplished by the faithful men and women of this old church. In the year 1883 the Little Home Female association met with Mt. Horeb church and continued in session three days. Great interest was manifested at this meeting in the district mission work and steps were taken looking to the enlargement of this work. W. H. Burnham was elected moderator and S. W. Simcoe clerk. Elder J. S. Palmer of Columbia preached the introductory sermon. This was indeed an interesting and profitable meeting and very beneficial to Mt. Horeb church. This was the last time the association convened with this church, which has proven very detrimental to the old church. The meetings of the association were always a great spiritual uplift to the church. Want of time and spiritual power precludes the possibility of Mt. Horeb. (located as it is) having the privilege and pleasure of entertaining the association. The brethren are too busy to go far from the railroads, or spend much time in attending the Lord's work. Following the close of the labors of Elders Bibb and Tuttle the following minister have from time to time served the church as pastors and have done good efficient work, W. H. Tipton, J. B. Conley, A. G. Mitchell, W. H. Burnham, J. B. Moore, T. M. Milan, J. M. Newson, S. S. Keith and Cecil Logan. In the year 1897 the church under the pastoral care of R. E. McQuis, decided to remove the old church house and rebuild on the same ground. Consequently a neat frame meeting

house was erected and on the fourth Sunday in October the house was dedicated free of debt. Rev. S. M. Brown of Kansas City preached the dedication sermon. Among those who were early associated with Mt. Horeb Church were Marcus Cole, and His wife Dorcus, who came to this country from Tennessee in the year 1818, and settled on a little stream called Lisenberry, afterwards called Coles branch in Montgomery County. He was a hatter by trade, and took great pleasure in furnishing the pastors of Mt. Horeb church with new hats. It is said while Brother Marcus Cole lived the Pastors of Mount Horeb always wore good hats. Of the descendants of Brother Cole there were fifty six who were members of Mt. Horeb church. Another old soldier of Mt. Horeb, a grand old man, was Brother Warren Tate, who died in his 90th year. Most all of his large family of children became members of the old church that their father and grand father loved so dearly. His companion, the mother of most of his children, remained true to the old church, and died at the age of 87. Dr. Bolton stood for many years as one of the pillars of Mt. Horeb church. He was hale and hearty, active in church and business life and continued to practice medicine after he had passed his four score years. He was said to be the oldest practicing physician in north Missouri. On Saturday before the second Sunday in July 1913 it was decided by the church that, at the next regular meeting a celebration of the 80th anniversary of the organization be held and that during said meeting Bro. A. R. Cole be ordained to the full work of gospel ministry. So on Saturday before the second Sunday in August, 1913 after a thorough examination by the council consisting of Brethern, W. H. Barnham, C. C. Long, R. W. Hunley, R. E. McQuie, and J. Griffin, the ordination was completed, setting apart Bro. Cole to the full work of gospel ministry. And on Sunday the next day, the celebration of the 80th anniversary of the organization of Mount Horeb church was held. It was a wonderful day and the sisters had prepared an abundance of good eats. The brethern who assisted in the ordination remained over. Bro. C. C. Long preached and several of the Brethern made deifing speeches. Bro. R. E. McQuie being pastor at this time, continued to serve the church in this capacity until December 1915. Bro. W. R. Milan was next pastor, and on the 9th day of September, 1916 the church met in council for the purpose of setting apart for the gospel ministry Bro. R. E. Snethen. The council was composed of the following Brethern, Rev. W. H. Barnham, W. A. Pipkin, J. S. Arvin, W. G. Hopper, R. W. Hunley, W. R. Milan, and A. R. Cole. Brother Snethen after a through examination, was regulary ordained to the gospel ministry. The following Deacons also assisted in the ordination D. T. Milikan, S. M. Cole, D. P. Hampton, C. R. Tate, Ely Bratten, J. D. Cole and Pearl Tate. Brother Milan served the church one year and resigned. The next pastor was R. W. Hunley, who had been pastor for the church for years before, and was always ready to assist the church as a supply or in any way he could. Rev. J. M. Newsome served the church as pastor from April 1919 until August 1923. Rev. J. S. Keith was the last pastor for the church before Bro. Cecil Logan who is pastor at the present time. He is liked as pastor, and much loved by his members. The Brethern and sisters are still pressing toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus. They invited all the Brethern who have preached at

the old Church in the past, and are still living, whom they could locate, and their many friends, to meet with them at a homecoming at the church, on the third Sunday in August 1933 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of its organization. They would so like to entertain their association once more but the chances seem to be against them on account of the location. Mr. Moreb church was duly celebrated. It was a grand day. The sisters had prepared a wonderful feast for the people. If any one was hungry it was certainly their own fault. There was preaching in the forenoon by the pastor Cecil Logan. After which the history of the church was read by Joseph Tate. After the noon hour several letters from pastors who were unable to be present were read and Rev. J. M. Newson preached a great instructive and complimentary sermon. Some of the others present who addressed the meeting were, Judge Robert Lamar of Fulton, Mo. Rev. J. H. Wims of Wright City, Mo. and Rev. E. E. McGuire of Montgomery City, Mo., Six ministers, namely Robert C. Hill, James M. Tuttle, B. B. Black, Martin Luther Bibb, A. E. Cole, and R. E. Snethen, have been ordained and set out by Mt. Moreb Church. The following named Brethren have been licensed by the church to preach the gospel, Granville Hunnley, John D. Gregory, William Penn, A. E. Cole and R. E. Snethen. The following Brethren have served from time to time as clerks of the church, Samuel Boone, Granville Hunnley, James Gregory, R. H. Tate, H. Thornhill, E. B. Scanlin, J. P. Tate, Joe W. Tate, George Dutton, and H. T. Haughton. The following have served as Deacons, William Hawkins, Benjamin Brashear, Jossis Van Cleave, Samuel Boone, Harrison Gregory, Harrison Cole, John W. Lowellyn, Hammond Hays, Alonza Boone, Wm C. Cole, Robert D. Graham, Baswell Holt, Warren Tate, Ed Thornhill, C. B. Tate, G. W. Dutton, J. P. Tate, J. D. Cole, David Hampton, and others whose names we failed to get from the records. Mr. Moreb has always stood firm for the doctrine of the old book, has been prompt in the exercise of discipline. Altho the dark clouds of discord have hovered over the old church, yet there were always members enough who possessed wisdom, courage, grace and patience sufficient to disperse the dark clouds and by grace of God restore peace and harmony great far reaching and marvelous has been the work and influence of this old church, since its organization, now 100 years ago over 1000 persons have been received into its fellowship mostly by experience and Baptism. Let us hope and pray that the old church may continue to flourish and for years to come truly be a city set upon a hill. Whose Radiant Light shall never grow dim.

METHODISM IN S. W. MONTGOMERY COUNTY, MO.
A HISTORY OF TRINITY METHODIST
CHURCH

Located in Lower Loutre Township, Section 2
Twp. 46N, Range 6W

This Wesleyan Evangel was brought to the upper reaches of the Dry Fork of Loutre by it's first permanent settlers. Peter Hunter led his clan from Rutherford County, N. C. into the roadless wilds of North Missouri early in the spring of 1819. His oldest son, James, had been licensed exhorter at the early age of seventeen, so came to this new home an experienced minister when twenty-eight years of age, and with a family of a devout wife and three small children.

For a number of years public service here must have been limited to the family group; but parents, six brothers, two sisters, and several in-laws were not to be despised for a congregation.

At the time of this settlement the neighbors were Isaacs Van Biers Tavern at Loutre Lick, now Mineola and Fort Clamson, now McKittrick. There were two hunters and trappers, Hardesty and Rowdshall, occupying a cabin a few weeks each year some miles west of the Hunter Farm. Other settlers came in rapidly after statehood two years later.

In the spring of 1832 another Methodist, class leader and steward, entered land some eight to ten miles northeast of the Hunter holdings. This was Lane Posey Rigg with a family of eight children.

Services were being held in the various cabin homes, but these rooms were much too small to accomodate the growing congregation. A church was needed and these people recognized the urge.

One pleasant day in late summer a group of interested men gathered on a hilltop one mile or more northwest of the present town of Americus and began work of the building of a log room to be used as a church.

Tradition says that Peter Hunter with seven sons and a son-in-law, and Lane Rigg with five sons and a son-in-law, represent a majority of the group. However, the same source reports the presence of a youth lately arrived from Switzerland, one Charles Autenreith, who moved a rotting log to make way for a foundation stone and set a foot in the midst of a yellow-jacket's nest. These fierce little wasps set upon him so furiously he promptly jumped out of his clothes.

In a short time a large room was enclosed, roofed with riven clapboards over rafters fastened at both ends with dogwood pins. Any plank was made laboriously with hand drawn rip saw. So the floor was of puncheons-split logs raised to a reasonably even surface and most of the posts were of similar timbers set upon four legs, stiff sticks driven into auger holes. All nails were made on anvils by smiths hammering them out tediously one at a time. For this reason, pioneers overcame many handicaps by substitution. Stiff blackoak poles supplied joists, rafters, door and window frames and other similar uses.

The name Bethlehem was chosen for this new church. No record of hand shows the exact date of this building. James Hunter died March 26, 1835 at the early age of 43, and the Reverend Andrew Monroe preached his funeral. Forty years later a grandson wrote his own childhood, quote: "I saw and heard many preachers in my widowed grandmother's home. Among them, I recall Andrew Monroe, Robert Hutton, Robert Danley, George Smith, Robert Jourdan, E. M. Marvin, later Bishop, and Dr. Bond."

These men were pastors of the Danville Circuit and the time and order of their services could be learned if we locate conference minutes of the eighteen thirties.

When the Methodist Episcopal Church divided in 1844, stewards of Bethlehem were present at the Danville Quarterly Conference that voted that circuit into the Methodist Episcopal Church, Southern. From these items it seems likely that Bethlehem was built before 1840.

In the summer of 1873, the pastor of the Danville Circuit, who may have been the Rev. Henry Kay, held a meeting under a brush arbor near the William Clark home on the north bank of Dry Fork a short distance below the union of its two branches. This site was chosen that people might have the use of fresh pure water from a large spring nearby. The meeting resulted in a large number of converts from all sides of Bethlehem.

Doubtlessly the selection of the hilltop site for old Bethlehem had been compromise. Tolison Hunter gave the land. His father and some brothers lived near him on the north branch of Dry Fork. His brother, Ephraim, lived above Americus on the south branch of it. So it was made an even climb for both parties.

Most people walked to church in those days. There were few if any farm wagons 'till much later. Hauling was done in ox-carts of two wheels or on wheel-less lizards. The ox step was too slow even for these foot-men and their bridle paths were ill suited to wheels.

Lafayette Benson gave a new site near the grounds of the arbor meeting, and through the years of 1874 and 1875, a new frame church was built. Its pews were a long step from the old puncheons, and the remainder of the house was up to a similar standard. It was well ahead of its time in both material and craftsmanship. Two doors on the east end opened into aisles, and a strong rail midway between these doors tied the seats front to back. This plan seated the women out in the cold on the north side and the men in lonesome southern warmth, a custom that was seldom broken for a score of years.

The builders seem to have thought a new building merits a new name. Bethlehem, meaning the "House of Bread" or "The Place of Plenty" was left off and the new house was called "Trinity", meaning "An Altar of the Triune God."

For a decade or more, old Bethlehem was left to the owls and the rats. Soon only those strong log walls remained of the pride of a community. In the late eighteen thirties, some negroes living East of Garrett's Mill moved these logs, hauling them some miles over very rough

hills to erect a place of worship that served their needs for some twenty years. Later a woodfire burned the unguarded building. In the summer of 1913 a quarterly conference of the New Florence Circuit appointed a committee to consider moving Trinity into Americus. Opposition arose among members on the north and east so the committee took no action.

Early in 1919 at a meeting at the Americus School house a motion was passed in favor of the action. Foremost among the advocates in favor of removal was Benjamin Sharp Baker and J. Ernest Blackmore. After soliciting several influential members who either did not respond very liberally or in many instances, opposed the plan, Mr. Baker became discouraged and wanted to give up. Mr. Blackmore felt the cause of our master and the church would advance if the change was made. Believing this he was not easily discouraged for he felt that God could overcome any difficulties in their way. Bro. Baker was easily converted to this belief and decision on his part always meant action. Being a man who believed that his possessions were intrusted to him to use for the furtherance of the cause of Christ he gave very liberally of his time and means toward the work. Each day God brought to their assistance men who were at first either disinterested or opposed to the plan until when the church was finally dedicated on July 5, 1919 in the presence of a large crowd, then every member was in favor of the change. Something over \$800. was raised by voluntary contributions and not a cent of indebtedness remained.

The dedicatory sermon was preached by Rev. Tadlock of St. Louis at 10:30 A. M. In the afternoon, presiding Elder White delivered an excellent sermon, and Dr. W. K. Jacobs of Montgomery City rendered a beautiful solo. The entire service was very inspiring and it was a great day and one long to be remembered. This time the name Trinity went with the building. Trinity's spire continues to point upward and every transient as well as each resident is called to thoughts of God and his care when passing it. It is always a silent messenger of truth to all who go by that way. The gospel brought from the Carolinas that James Hunter sowed on the frontier footpaths was picked up by mountain men with saddlebags full of Bibles and tracts, men in linen dusters followed them on wheels and today's mobile units continue to call out from this silent house of prayer, "Lo, Jesus of Nazareth passed by." The End.

LOCATION:

Bethel Cemetery lies almost exactly in the center of Section 20, Township 49N, Range VI w. in Montgomery County Mo. It is reached by traveling west out of Montgomery City for four miles, then northwest (road angles) about one and one half miles, then north (crooked road) about one mile.

Bethel Church, which lies just west of the cemetery, was founded as an M. E. South church, but is now a Methodist Episcopal church. It was begun as a BRUSH ARBOR in pioneer days. It was organized in 1820, and a log building was erected about the same time. Fire destroyed this log building and all records. In 1865 Bethel was re-organized by William Eads, a pastor, and a frame building was erected in 1869. Mr. C. D. Maupin and his wife, and P. Harrison, were among the first members.
