A Column from THE MONTGOMERY STANDARD dated Sept. 30, 1887

"Cover My Defenceless Head"

A number of tourists formed a part of a large company gathered on the deck of a steamer that was moving down the Potomac river one beautiful evening in the summer of 1881. A gentleman on board sang "Jesus, Lover of my Soul." The singer gave the first two verses with much feeling, and peculiar emphasis upon the concluding lines that thrilled every heart. A hush had fallen upon the listeners that was not broken for some seconds after the musical notes had died away. Then a gentleman made his way from the outskirts of the crowd to the side of the singer and accosted him, "Beg your pardon, stranger, but were you actively engaged in the late war?" "Yes, sir," the man of song answered courteously; "I fought under General Grant."

"Well," the speaker continued, with something like a sigh, "I did my fighting on the other side, and think - indeed am quite sure - that I was very near you one bright night eighteen years ago this very month. It was much such a night as this. If I am not mistaken, you were on guard duty. We of the south had sharp business on hand, and you were one of the enemy. I crept near your post of duty, my murderous weapon in my hand; the shadows hid me. Your beat led you into the clear light. As you paced back and forth, you were humming the hymn you have just sung. I raised my gun and aimed at your heart, and I had been selected by our commander for the work, for I was a sure shot. Then out in the air rang the words - "Cover my defenceless head With the shadow of Thy wing."

"Your prayer was answered. I couldn't fire after that. And there was no attack made upon the camp that night. I felt sure, when I heard you sing this evening, that you were the man whose life I was spared from taking."

The singer grasped the hand of the southerner, and said with much emotion, "I remember the night very distinctly, the feeling of depression and loneliness with which I went forth to my duty. I knew my post was one of great danger, and I was more dejected than I was at any other time during the service. I paced my lonely beat, thinking of home and friends, and all that life holds dear. The thought of God's care for all that He has created came to me with peculiar force. If He cares so much for the sparrow, how much more for man, created after his own image, and I sang the prayer of my heart, and ceased to feel alone. How the prayer was answered, I never knew until this evening. My Heavenly Father thought best to keep the knowledge from me for eighteen years. How much of His goodness to us we shall be ignorant of until it is revealed to us by the light of eternity. 'Jesus, Lover of my Soul' had been a favorite hymn; now it will be inexpressibly dear."

The incident forming the subject of the above sketch is a true one, and was related to the writer by a lady who was one of the party on the steamer. EX

An Article from the MONTGOMERY STANDARD newspaper printed in Montgomery City, Missouri, dated March 2, 1888

Mrs. Ann M. Goodrich

Some two and thirty years ago, Capt. I.F. Goodrich and household emigrated from the extreme northeast, from Portland, Maine, and settled in Montgomery county, MO, just outside the corporate limits of the thriving town of Montgomery City. Here they lived in comfort and found congenial friends and associates in the town nearby.

On Friday evening, the 17th inst., we laid to rest in the family burying ground, on what was once the "Hopkins' estate," the aged body of the wife and mother of this family, the husband and father having been gathered to the dead 16 years ago. The deceased had reached the eve of her 72nd birthday - was a woman of bright intellect, of pure character, of indomitable will, and of sterling worth - the adviser, friend, and well-wisher of every one.

Judging from her store of information, she had been an attentive reader of the printed page, and a close observer of passing events for earlier years. She pored over daily and weekly journals and magazines, and other literature, to within a few months of her release, and kept well abreast with the current news of the day. When she came across striking thoughts or paragraphs, she would either clip them for preservation or transcribe them with her own hand. It was a treat, indeed, to sit under the droppings from her full, communicative mind. However, as the attentive listener would very soon discover, she lived and moved, for the most part, among the people and scenes of forty, fifty and sixty years ago.

In those earlier times her husband had been of that brave and hardy company who "go down to the sea in ships, that do business in great waters," and as captain of a vessel, visited the leading seaport towns of the world. The faithful wife accompanied him on one of his voyages, and the interest would become absorbing when she would relate some of her old world impressions and experiences. Once she said: "While visiting in Amsterdam, Holland, I felt so insignificant, and my America seemed but of yesterday with her oldest colonial structures, when I stood beneath and my eyes rested upon hoary buildings which could boast of an existence of more than five hundred years."

When her conversation turned upon Portland, Me., her birthplace, she was even more interesting. It was a city that enrolled among its citizens some who became famous. She was the school-mate and bosom friend of Mrs. Elizabeth Prentiss, the authoress of "Stepping Heavenward," and the daughter of that saintliest of men, Rev. Edward Payson, who for many years had charge of the Congregational church in Portland. She was familiar, too, with

the early life of Longfellow, the poet. They both were born and grew up in the same New England city. The poet, whose father was a prominent lawyer in Portland, went to and from school, when a boy, right by her father's house. She also knew much concerning Mrs. H.B. Stowe, whose first husband was reared in Portland. To complete the roll of worthies whom she knew from girlhood in and around her native place, would make this sketch too long.

The departed was much in love with the out-door world. One of the pets of her heart was a beautiful orchard. She looked upon the trees as her mute children, and, in a sense, they were, for she had planted them and nursed them for 25 years. On one occasion she conducted the writer through it, going from tree to tree, laying her hand upon each and relating her treatment of the well developed trunks and branches. In the language of O.W. Holmes, she would say: "Trees are man's friends. They tell no secrets and will not betray you."

She had been a member of the church for about half a century, first of the Congregational church, then of the Presbyterian church in Montgomery City, MO., for five and twenty years. Her Bible was kept near at hand, and she read it and meditated upon its teachings. A significant paper mark in the Bible, (and it must have been the very last one placed by her hand), opened to that beautiful 5th chapter of second Corinthians, beginning: "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle be dissolved, we have a building of God," etc. Another link that bound us to the past is thus removed. We shall miss our aged friend. All of her that was mortal now reposes in "God's little acre," until the resurrection, but her spirit has gone to Him who gave it. Peace be to her ashes.
