An Incident of Missouri History - In 1804, congress divided Louisiana into two territories by a line running with the 33d degree parallel of north latitude. In 1812 the territory of Missouri was organized and in 1819 Arkansas was established. Bound by social and commercial ties with up-the-river places, the people in this section appealed for inclusion. Prominent among state characters was Col. John Hardiman Walker, who owned large tracts of land in Pemiscot and Dunklin counties. He wined and dined the surveyors and afterwards went in company with Godfrey Lesieur and several other leading citizens of this section to Washington. Their visit was successful. Through their influence, the line from the Mississippi River to St. Francois River was lowered to the parallel of 36 degrees. Agriculturally, the inclusion of these counties has been a good thing for MO. Here cotton thrives as in no other place in the U.S., alfalfa flourishes and watermelons from this section beat the world. Excellent exhibits have been prepared from these counties, which offer great opportunities to the homeseeker. The leading newspapers of these counties have taken active interest in the state newspaper exhibit and the MO volume being prepared by the MO World's Fair Commission will dwell at length on the agricultural actualities and possibilities of MO's delta lands. by E.P. A Lincoln Story - When Abraham Lincoln was a lawyer in Ill. he and a certain judge once got to bantering each other about trading horses, and it was agreed that the next morning at 9 o'clock they would make a trade, the horses to be unseen up to that hour, and no backing out, under a forfeiture of \$25. At the appointed hour, the judge came up, leading the sorriest looking specimen of a horse ever seen in those parts. In a few minutes Mr. Lincoln was seen approaching with a wooden saw horse upon his shoulders. Great were the shouts and the laughter of the crowd and both were greatly increased when Mr. Lincoln on surveying the judge's animal, set down his saw horse and exclaimed: "Well, Judge, this is the first time I ever got the worst of it in a horse trade."
